Numbers

There are 18 different churches listed in the Leighton-Linslade Churches Together website.

Trying to purchase a Bible from an online bookshop there are 1116 different versions to choose from. That is even after narrowing it down to Christian Bibles as opposed to instruction manuals for other things.

No doubt each bible has subtle alterations to make it accessible to its target audience, but what do we edit out? Subtle changes in vocabulary can drastically alter the meaning of a text and the inferences we take from cross referencing the language used.

How often do we selectively interpret the bible to fit in with our own view of the world? We should remember “The stone which the builders rejected turned out to be the most important of all.” (Psalms 118:22) This could also be the same with the words we choose to use and the people with whom we associate.

At the same time Jesus warned us against presenting too much information and making our prayers excessively long and complicated.

No doubt our services would be less personal if all these separate churches were replaced with one large one and our bibles may be harder to read without a bit of editing.

The Numbers section of the Old Testament details the census carried out by Moses dividing up the people attributed to the different tribes of Israel. Goodness knows how they managed before the days of computers with everybody moving around all the time.

At the same time there is the Parable of the Good Shepherd who leaves his flock to try to find the one that is missing. We need to be mindful about what we leave out.

Messy Church

Messy Church happens at Trinity in it's "normal" format five times a year (each school holidays) and at Christmas we organise the Messy Nativity service for Christmas Eve.

This is what a "normal" session looks like:

2pm—Volunteers arrive and are assigned their role. The team is briefed about what the session will be about and we have a prayer.

2.30pm—Families arrive and we spend 15 minutes in the church colouring paper bags to collect their crafts in. We welcome the families and explain what is going to happen and what the theme is.

2.45pm—Families go into the hall for a variety of theme appropriate crafts and activities. These often include a food activity (decorating cakes or biscuits), sensory play activities (especially for our younger members but enjoyed by all), games and crafts (some messier than others!)

3.30pm—We all go into the church for a Celebration, this includes a story, lively songs (often with actions or dance moves) and prayer.

4pm—Tea time is in the hall, this is often a cold tea, followed by cakes.

4.30pm—Families leave and volunteers help to tidy up.

Over the past year we have looked at a wide variety of bible passages and stories including Easter, Psalm 139 and Creation and our responsibility to look after the Earth.

There are many roles within Messy Church including planning, setting up, helping on an activity table, helping in the kitchen and tidying up. If you feel able to do any of these roles, please speak to Tasha Williams in the church office.



Your personal data - GDPR

As I am sure you know on 25 May 2018, the EU's General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) came into force, putting far greater pressure on everyone, including churches, to manage, protect and dispose of citizens' personal data in an appropriate manner. Personal data means any information which identifies an individual – their address, date of birth, email address, telephone number etc.

At Trinity we collect information about our members and adherents for the Church Directory. The purpose of the Directory is to promote the work and activities of the church at Trinity and information should not be used for any other purpose. Everyone who is listed in the Directory is given a printed copy for their personal use - it is not a public document and should be kept securely.

It is important that the details in the Directory are accurate, so as part of the revision process for the 2019 Directory we will be asking you to give us up-to-date contact details. Please return the form promptly! We will also be asking you to indicate if you wish your name to be included in the printed Directory, and if you wish to receive communications from Trinity by electronic means (e.g. email). Email addresses are not listed in the printed Directory but circulation of Weekly News and Trumpeter by email helps the church to reduce printing costs. Anyone who needs email addresses for church business (e.g. in relation to committee activities or Church Council meetings) can use this information providing individuals give their permission.

Some church activities require us to hold information about individuals who have not completed a Directory update form, or additional information not collected for the Directory. In that case, it is important to have EXPLICIT permission to hold these details.

This is best done through a signed form or email clarification, which is stored in a secure place. Equally importantly, this information must be deleted when it is no longer required for the stated purpose. If you think this may apply to you, talk to Anne Gray or Catherine Roots to be sure that you understand what is involved.

It is important to respect the privacy of personal data, and not include phone numbers, email addresses etc. where it will be on public display – e.g. on a poster for the church notice board. If in doubt, ask permission.

I realise that all this sounds complex, and possibly “over the top”, but it is the law and we must comply. Privacy is important to each of us, and it is good to understand how we handle the information we have about each other.
