From the Manse

The light turned yellow as he approached the traffic lights. He did the right thing and stopped at the light, even though he might have beaten the red light by accelerating through the intersection.

The tailgating woman behind him was furious and honked her horn, screaming in frustration, as she missed her chance to get through the intersection.

As she was still in mid-rant, she heard a tap on her window and looked up into the face of a very serious police officer.

The officer ordered her to exit her car with her hands up. He took her to the police station where she was searched, fingerprinted, photographed and placed in a holding cell. After a couple of hours, a policeman approached the cell and opened the door.

She was escorted back to the booking desk where the arresting officer was waiting with her personal effects.

He said, "I'm very sorry for this mistake. You see, I pulled up behind your car while you were blowing your horn, giving the guy in front of you the finger and swearing and cursing at him. I noticed the 'What Would Jesus Do' bumper sticker, the 'Choose Life' license plate, the 'Follow Me to Sunday School' bumper sticker, and the chrome-plated Christian fish emblem on the boot, so naturally...I assumed you had stolen the car."

This sort of joke or critique provides us with an insight into how many people 'see' Christians and Christianity. This joke, and much of the media commentary about Christians, shows us that many people have a very limited understanding of faith. They see it as adherence to some strict moral code and that's about it. It's all about what we do and what we don't do. No wonder they see our human failings as hypocrisy.

The opportunity to engage more fully with our non-Christian friends and family members is one we must embrace. Not because we don't want to be the subject of their jokes, but because we want them to understand the truth about the gospel.

To be a Christian and to believe in the truth about the gospel is to be accepted and loved by God who accepts us with all our faults and inconsistencies. To be a Christian is not about living a perfect life and being 'good' all the time. Somehow we need to get this message out there, otherwise Christians and the church will continue to be ridiculed for not 'living up' to society's expectations.

As Christians, we are always going to disappoint those around us; that's part of being human! But as we gather together in authentic Christian communities, it is our desire that the 'heart' of what we are on about will come through. It will provide grace and forgiveness when our actions don't match our words, but it will also provide a welcoming space for others to see what the true story of the gospel is all about.

Connections Group

Do you know that Trinity has a Connections Group and, if you do, are you clear about what they do? The Connections Group is involved in developing the "public face" of Trinity within our town.

Our work includes organisation of Trinity's presence at the May Fayre, which involves booking stalls, deciding on a theme, preparing materials for children's activities, organising a rota of helpers and promoting our church activities at the event.

At Christmas we are responsible for choosing the Trinity Christmas Card and organising its distribution, arranging "Carols and Cake" and the Messy Sheep Trail as well as encouraging church groups in the decoration of the church windows.

During the year, our ongoing responsibilities include maintaining our website and social media presence and keeping poster displays and publicity material up to date.

At our meetings we also take time to consider any new ideas for any ways in which we can become a more visible presence in Leighton Buzzard. One of the things we are planning to start this month is a games afternoon. The Bible has very little to say on the subject of games, being more concerned with physical, emotional and spiritual matters, but life involves a lot of sitting around and we need something to do as we wait for our seeds to grown for the plant sale in May.

Games are designed to get people to interact, socialise, share and negotiate, some as participants, others as spectators. Most games have a winner and a loser which many find a bad thing, preferring co-operative activities where everybody has to work together. Many think life is too short to play silly games. There are times when playing games may not be what we want to do, for example in the middle of a crisis or when we are grieving.

Ecclesiastes 9:11 says, "In this world the fast runners do not always win the race, the brave do not always win the battle. The wise don't always earn a living, intelligent people do not always get rich and capable people do not always rise to high positions. Bad luck happens to everyone. You never know when your time is coming."

It is all very well to read this but to understand it we need to experience emotions relating to gain and loss, uncertainty, waiting and following rules that are usually written by somebody else. In life things don't always go our way even when we think we deserve it. Sometimes we are better prepared for this if we have had a little practice.

Matthew 16:26 says, "Will the people gain anything if they win the whole world but lose their life?"

Sometimes the things we strive for are not worth the effort. As we get more life experience we more often, "Meet triumph and disaster and treat those imposters just the same." (Rudyard Kipling.)

One of our church windows has the grid of noughts and crosses which is one of the simplest games we play. The pattern is the same as a check or a cross, which is the symbol of the Christian religion.

Ben Williams—A long walk

As many of you will know I started working for Urban Saints (alongside my Circuit work) in June 2018, and since then I have witnessed the impact that the charity has in transforming the lives of young people up and down the country.

Every year thousands of young people go away on Urban Saints Camps, which provide the opportunity for young people to grow in their faith, build friendships, and provide adventurous activities and crazy fun. While our camps keep their prices as low as possible, sadly there are still families who cannot afford to send their children away.

This is why on Friday 29th March 2019, I will be taking a long walking (from Elthorne Park, in North London, to our offices at Kestin House in Luton, around 28 miles) to raise money specifically for the Urban Saints Camps bursary fund. This will allow us to provide subsidies for young people who would really benefit from going away on an Urban Saints Camp. If I can raise £500 this would provide approximately 10 subsidised places on our summer camps in 2019.

We don't want anyone to miss out on the opportunity to come to an Urban Saints camp due to money. If you can possibly support me financially, I would be very grateful.

Retiring Collection for March—Leighton Linslade Homeless Service

The Leighton Linslade Homeless Service provides an emergency night shelter and other support and advice services at the old Black Horse pub in North Street.

We exist to relieve hardship, need and distress amongst those who are homeless or vulnerable, particularly those living in Leighton Buzzard, Linslade and the surrounding villages.

The Service is independent of the local authorities and relies heavily on volunteers and donations. It works closely with many of the town's churches to provide support to those in need on our streets but it is not a church-based organisation.

New volunteers are always welcome, particularly to help with night supervision.

Our main facility is the Black Horse Emergency Night Shelter at 21 North St, Leighton Buzzard LU7 1EQ.
