Where are they now. One off Special. By Colin Dimmock

When I received my last batch of Methodist Recorders which I get third or fourth hand I always feel guilt knowing who paid the £3.30 a week they cost nowadays.

The headline on the issue dated 14/6/19 caught my attention. It said 'Secretary of Conference steps down from his post'. So what, you may say. I am one of the few people left who will remember when the man who will fill the gap made his appearance in the then Leighton Buzzard and Stewkley Methodist Circuit. On a hot August Monday over 25 years ago I was at what they called 'The Stewkley Bazzar'. Who's that young man over there sitting on a bale of hay dressed in shorts and tee shirt with a young lady at his side, I heard folk say. Those in the know whispered the answer. That's the new minister, he has just moved into the manse next door. His name is Rev Jonathan Hustler. He had come as a very young minister having spent some time studying in Rome. When he came to Trinity for a Communion service he always wore white robes at Stewkley dear old Stan Gibbons gave him great encouragement.

The recorder mentions his stationing in Leighton Buzzard and Stewkley, Cleveland and Mid Lincolnshire being a superintendent for some years before returning to Wesley House Cambridge as Vice Principle and Director of Pastoral Studies. Little did I know that Jonathan would aspire to one of our Methodist top jobs as Secretary of Conference. Well done Jonathan. Then I remembered words spoken by one of our ministers Rev Leslie Holding. Methodist ministers, local preachers and members are all equal. We believe in the priesthood of all believers. But over the years I have discovered some are more equal than others.

Legacy Projects by Roger Owers

Late last year two projects were proposed for using legacy money donated to Trinity.

The first project for the Leadership Team was to consider how we can redevelop our church building, in particular making the front of our church more accessible and redeveloping the stage area of the hall. Although we were not expecting to be able to do everything with the legacy money we were hoping that this could provide a frame work for the future. We asked two architects who have experience of working with churches to help us with some ideas of what could be done. It soon became obvious that to make the whole of the church building more accessible from the front of the premises was going to be a major piece of work. It also raised a number of issues about how we really wanted to use our church buildings and we realised that we had not really developed our ideas enough to pursue an ambitious scheme at this stage.

The second project was to update the audio visual system in the church and to provide a more adequate system for Early Church in the hall. We invited two suppliers with church experience to make proposals about what we would need. One of them seemed far too expensive but the other has made some useful proposals. At the end of August we will have had a demonstration of some of the equipment they have suggested. Hopefully we will be able to bring some information to the next Church Council.

Church Council Summary—27th June, 2019

- Opening devotions led by Rev. Julie Bradshaw based on 1 Corinthians 12 on how the Church is like a single body and the Church Council is like the heartbeat of the church, so it is important that all parts are represented.
- Membership of the meeting agreed to be correct
- Pastoral concerns & courtesies Lyn Boughtflower did at the end of May, Brian Peckham died 14th June, Andy Cornfoot died 17th June. Prayers were offered for bereaved families.
- Minutes of the previous meeting approved and signed.
- Vacancies: Janet Curzon would like to step down from Church Council as a representative of the Outreach and Social Action Committee. The Leadership Team is working on ways to increase church representatives on Church Council.
- Life and Mission of the Church
- Worship Planning Meeting: A preaching series is planned for October
- **Pastoral Oversight:** nothing new to report, more Pastoral Friends and Links needed
- Outreach & Social Action: weekly Drop-In has been running for 6 years and is in need of new volunteers, a satellite food bank is being investigated, there will be an Oxjam concert on 5th October, feasibility of running a Saturday morning games session is being investigated.
- Finance/Resources: Roger Owers reported that the church finances were in quite a reasonable position. A budget had been prepared for the next financial year. The Outreach budget is secure for the next year, but not for further ahead. The budget was adopted. Church Council approved an application for a grant from the Circuit (£1000) and District (£2000) to continue Messy Church. Church Council agreed to staff pay increases and new employment termination dates. Hall lettings increased by 50p/hr. See Roger's article on page 3 for information about legacy funds.
- **Property Committee:** the committee's report summarised work completed, in hand and planned for future including repointing under the Rose Window, new windows on the top floor, refurbishment of Chatteris Suite kitchen and audio-visual upgrade.

- Leadership Team: Leadership Team have taken responsibility for Publicity and Communication proposal in Next Steps Review. Major issue is lack of church members represented at Church Council.
- Early Church: Church Anniversary Sunday—services will run differently. Church Family Picnic at Rushmere Country Park 21st July.
- Messy Church: Tasha Williams and Graham Seaton attended the International Messy Church Conference in May. We discovered ours is one of the largest in the country. More help is needed now we are running an extra session (August) and we take the children aged 7+ for more age appropriate activities.
- **Safeguarding:** Updated safeguarding policy agreed. There is some changes afoot for the advanced training module programme.
- Health & Safety: nothing to report
- Churches Together: Kathy Keeley reported on the meeting held on 25th June, 2019.
- Circuit Matters: Ben Williams has left his post as Circuit Lay-Worker, Rev. Joanne Sherwood has been appointed. Stationing for 2020 has begun to replace Eric Mustapha. Circuit is not organising a trip to 3Generate but funding is available for anyone wishing to attend. Circuit Next Steps Review should be discussed at next Church Council.

Joint Public Issues Team: Church Leaders' letter to the new Prime Minister: a no-deal Brexit is gambling with the basic needs of our poorest citizens

An open letter to the new Prime Minister from leaders of 7 Christian denominations expresses concern that failing to agree a deal on Brexit will "hit those held back by poverty very hard indeed".

The Church leaders say they have been "compelled" to write to the new Prime Minister because of his position that leaving the European Union without a deal is acceptable.

The letter states that "At a time when increasing numbers of families have difficulties putting enough food on the table, we believe it is irresponsible to consider a course of action that is expected to make that situation worse".

The Church leaders say that "It is notable that assurances about our ability to cope with a no-deal Brexit, while frequent, are yet to be supported by substantial evidence" and ask the Government to publish evidence of the impact a no-deal Brexit on disadvantaged communities. The letter also invites the Prime Minister to visit one of the many social actions projects run by churches to support millions of citizens who live in poverty.

The letter is signed by leaders from the Methodist Church of Great Britain, the United Reformed Church, the Baptist Unions of Great Britain, Scotland and Wales, the Church of Scotland, the Salvation Army, Quakers in Britain and the Scottish Episcopal Church, which together have approximately 700, 000 members.

Specific concerns over food supply, pricing as well as availability of medical supplies and energy are raised in the letter.

The letter warns that, in the event that a deal is not reached, "In essence, the Government will be relying on the hope that our former EU partners are willing to co-operate even without an agreement – a huge gamble to take with the basic needs of our poorest citizens and communities."

The full text of the letter is here:

Dear Mr Johnson

As Churches, we have a particular care and concern for the people in our society who are locked in poverty. Around the country, local churches are helping families to cope with the rising tide of poverty. Projects range from simple coffee mornings run by a few volunteers, to large projects such as foodbanks, homeless support, employment advice and debt counselling.

With this in mind, we are compelled to write expressing our urgent concern about your position that leaving the European Union without a deal is acceptable.

Advice and data from multiple reputable sources, including the UK Government, indicate that failing to agree a deal will hit those held back by poverty very hard indeed.

The UK imports 10,000 shipping containers of food from the EU each day. These containers are part of long and complex integrated supply chains. Even minor disruptions to this chain have in the past rapidly had serious consequences. A no-deal Brexit will cause a huge and potentially crippling disruption. Government and many other reputable sources highlight the immediate risk of shortages and price rises. Over the longer term they point to the costs of new and less fluid supply chains increasing food bills for families.

Last year our partner, Trussell Trust, which represents around half of the UK's foodbanks, gave out a record-breaking 1.6 million 3-day supplies of food. At a time when increasing numbers of families have difficulties putting enough food on the table, we believe it is irresponsible to consider a course of action that is expected to make that situation worse.

It is also unclear how a wide range of other vital products and services will continue to be delivered in the event of a no-deal Brexit. Government, industry and charity sources indicate potential problems with both energy and medical supplies.

The UK Government's no-deal planning documents highlight that many of the difficulties caused by a no-deal Brexit can only be tackled in collaboration with the EU. The Cabinet Office states that for many issues we must seek accommodations with the EU which are "not within the UK's gift to unilaterally control or mitigate". In essence, the Government will be relying on the hope that our former EU partners are willing to cooperate even without an agreement – a huge gamble to take with the basic needs of our poorest citizens and communities.

The impacts of a no-deal Brexit are at best highly uncertain, and at worst deeply worrying. Our view that it would put at risk the welfare and safety of the poorest communities in the UK is formed on the basis of the best available evidence, including our presence in local communities in every part of the UK. It is notable that assurances about our ability to cope with a no-deal Brexit, while frequent, are yet to be supported by substantial evidence. Evidence-free dismissals of well-founded concerns are at this stage both dangerous and inappropriate. Your Government's willingness to embrace a no-deal Brexit places upon it a responsibility to demonstrate that the most vulnerable in our communities, those locked in poverty, will not be harmed.

We ask that your Government urgently publishes its current evidence on the impact of a no-deal Brexit on disadvantaged communities. We would also be pleased to welcome you to one of our many projects to hear from those who a no-deal Brexit may most impact.

Rather than being absent from the debate, this evidence and these communities should be at the heart of our debates around Brexit. We assure you of our prayers as you take up this challenging new role. Yours sincerely

Retiring Collection on 8th September for World Mission

- The World Mission Fund enables the Methodist Church to encourage, build and maintain long-term mission partnerships with countries across the world.
- It also provides support to overseas partners to spread the good news through engaging in mission, evangelism, multi-faith relationships, church growth, education and advocacy.
- £2.5m The Connexional Grants Committee awarded £2.5 million of grants from the World Mission Fund in 2016/2017 (£3 million in 2015/2016) to Partner Churches and organisations overseas, to help leaders in their communities deliver their strategic plans and become more sustainable for long-term mission. In addition, £1 million was spent in 2016/2017 on the mission partner programme.
- £60,000 Junior Mission for All (JMA) collectors raised more than £60,000 in 2016/2017 (£73,150 in 2015/2016). Of this, 80% was used for mission work overseas.

- **34** There are 34 mission partners from Britain and Ireland, funded in 16 countries overseas.
- £3.5m In 2016/2017, the World Mission Fund received £3.5 million. Total outgoings in 2016/2017 were £3.8 million.
- £355,295— Thanks to Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB), in 2017 the Easter Offering collection for the World Mission Fund totalled £355,295.
