'You do know what would have happened if it had been three wise WOMEN instead of men, don't you? They would have asked for directions rather than navigate the star, arrived on time, helped deliver the baby, cleaned the stable, made a casserole, and brought disposable nappies as gifts!'

It is one of the Christmas jokes I have found on the internet. It's about practicality and preparation.

'Preparation'. We have preparation time before Christmas. Most shops ask us to prepare for Christmas by shopping. The over-commercialization of Christmas is perhaps one of the most meaningful invitations Christians receive to explain our participation in Advent as a season. Our world has decided that Christmas is equated with consumerism, and the church should offer a counter-narrative framed in the confessional – and yet joyful – lens of Advent.

It's the start of the church calendar and a time for preparing our hearts and minds. Preparing, not just Christmas, but for the whole of the coming year. Because Christmas reminds us 'Immanuel' came to us in the form of a baby and is with us by his death and resurrection.

Advent preparation is not just for the celebration of Christmas but the life with and in Jesus Christ for the coming new year. It should begin with remembering the wonderful work of God in our lives in the last year. It gives us new expectations for the new year with his plan. Our joy does not come from Christmas presents we receive in the morning of Christmas day, but the perfect gift we have already received.

The nights are getting cold now and we should remember those who brave the cooler temperatures, including animals. Having the right food, drink, shelter and clothing makes a huge difference to the length of time we can stay outside.

Jesus was born in a stable, comfortable enough in warm temperatures but not so much for a human in the cold. In a well-known carol there is the line, "You shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger."

These strips of cloth are easy enough to make for somebody beginning to learn how to process textiles and are suitable for a baby new to the world.

Where are they now? Bob and Margaret Harris

As many of you know, we are now living in Ashby-de-la-Zouch in Leicestershire, about five minutes away from our daughter Sharon and family. We are retired, though sometimes we wonder how we ever found time to go to work. We certainly are not retired from church activities, though they have certainly changed. We attend Melbourne Methodist Church in Derbyshire, approx. 15 minutes drive from where we live. It is a very active church with many young families and a large group of young people. We are still local preachers in a large circuit; though with some small congregations. We have taken on no leadership roles in our church but are involved in many of the activities.

Twice a month we have what we call 'Splash' which is play and praise for under school age children and their parents, carers and in some cases grandparents. It is based on a Bible story which is told in several different ways; through puppets; being read from the Bible; and activities. It also involves songs; times of free play and drinks and food. That's where we come in; serving teas, coffee, cakes, fruit and biscuits but we also have the opportunity to sit & chat with the parents etc. and also to hold the babies. We had our youngest baby the other week who was just 6 days old.

At the other end of the spectrum we have our afternoon tea service once a month, when a proper afternoon tea is served with delicious sandwiches and cakes etc. It also includes an opportunity to sing their favourite hymns, a bible sketch; talk and prayers. Another chance to sit and chat with people.

Margaret is back playing the guitar as part of the worship group which leads worship on a Sunday morning and for the songs in Splash.

Bob is still painting and takes part in the annual Melbourne art festival in September where over 100 venues are open for displaying art and crafts. Bob displays in the Church alongside other church members.

Our lives are not fully involved with the church. This is a lovely area to live in with several National Trust properties close by and we spend times visiting them; particularly Calke Abbey which is just up the road.

Family wise, Neil and Tanya live in Cheltenham with their four children and as we said before Sharon and Gary live locally with their three. Three of our grandchildren are now at university. Adam, now 21, is in his final year at Loughborough studying Sports Coaching. He spent last year in Dubai leading fitness classes at the American university in Dubai; spending Christmas in Nepal and trekking towards Everest. Leah and Johannah, both 18 are in their first years at University, with Leah at Winchester studying Sports Coaching and Johannah at Bristol studying Medicine. Jacob is 16, Samuel 13, Adonai 12 and Hope is 10. They're all growing up which I suppose means that we are growing "older".

We're still in touch with many from Trinity and it's great to hear news of old friends and all that's going on. Our love and prayers to you all.



Top tips for Bible reading

Article from 'Word in Action' Winter 2019 (Magazine produced by Bible Society)

Tips from helen Crawford, Digital Content Manager and Oldi Morava, Director of International Mission.

Two of our staff share their top tips for reading the Bible.

Get curious

If you're in a familiar passage or are coming to a text you know well, ask yourself where else in the Bible a similar theme or context occurs. Reading Ephesians? Look at Paul's history with Ephesus in Acts. Does the passage quote another part of Scripture? Check out the original. See how these explorations heighten your sense of what's going on.

Get perspective

If you tend to look into the details of a text and really try to 'rinse' a verse for all it's worth, challenge yourself to read through a book all in one go. You'll see the different patterns and possible form different conclusions. If you're used to looking at the big picture, dig into the detail.

Know what you're handling

Knowing which genre of text is in front of your will help make sense of what you're reading. You're going to interpret a letter differently to how you would a story, just as you'll respond to the 6 o'clock news differently to the adverts before it. If you're new to biblical genre, check out www.biblesociety.org.uk/genre

Pray

Pray before and after you read a passage. At the beginning pray that God will guide you and reveal himself through the passage that you're reading, perhaps by highlighting aspects you haven't noticed before. After reflecting on the text, turn what you have read into prayers for yourself and others, learn to make the Bible the vocabulary of your prayer life.

Use different translations

If you're stuffing a particular passage, read it in more than one translation of the Bible. The different renderings of translations may not only provoke your imagination, but also highlight some of the difficulties of the original text that you need to bear in mind when interpreting a passage.

- Pastoral concerns—Phyllis Tucker in L&D Hospital, Henry Franks in Elm Lodge, Jenny Webb in The Knolls & Isabel Dyer who had been in hospital.
- Minutes of previous meeting on 27th June 2019, agreed and signed.
- Appointments—David Dawes was nominated as Church Treasurer.
