Where are they now by Ray Roe

We all like surprises, especially nice one and I happened to receive one through the post inviting me to write a piece for your Church Magazine. So here goes.

Having belonged to the Methodist Church since the age of about six, I attended Sunday School as it was known then, followed by membership into the main Church at Hockliffe Street Wesleyan them, for a time, at Trinity Methodist on North Street.

Firstly, I must explain my background. My Grandfather Roe, a Christian gentleman, worshipped at the former Baptist Church in Lake Street and was a member of the Leighton Temperance Band and played bassoon; the actual instrument is still kept in the family. He also worked for Chamberlain Bros., outfitters in the High Street. My Grandfather, I have discovered, was born in 1868 and died in 1949.

Now, Grandfather's youngest son of five children, my own father, was born in 1898 and following service in the Black Watch Regiment in the First World War, 1914-1918, was offered an apprentice to a well-known business tailors and outfitters named Willoughby's in the City of London.

After successfully completing his apprenticeship as a master tailor, my father and mother lived in Lewisham, London for a time where my eldest brother was born in 1924. Later they moved to Sussex, where my other brother was born in 1929.

My father and mother and their two sons then had the opportunity to return to Leighton Buzzard to join my Grandfather in business at Market Square, which had living accommodation and it was there I was born on the 21st April, 1934. Despite worries of the Second World War starting in 1939, the year I started school, memories are still vivid of a happy childhood with my parents.

It was during my early years that I was introduced to Hockliffe Street Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School where I really enjoyed learning how to be a Christian and receiving books as prizes for attendance, which I still have in my possession. Sunday School in those days attracted large numbers of boys and girls, some of whom were evacuated to other parts of the country to avoid air raids.

As the years passed, inevitably changes came about. Hockliffe Street survived for one hundred years for 1864-1964, when it was closed. Atterbury Mission in Vandyke Road was also closed. Congregations from the three churches, Hockliffe Street, Atterbury Mission and North Street Primitive all joined as one thus forming North Street Trinity Methodist Church. It is not for me to say what people thought of the change but by meetings, prayer and guidance from our Lord; He has made His House His Home.

I do not think I would have uprooted my wife and family if it was not necessary. Top managers in the Government Department where I worked decided that my Grade was too high for the work I was doing at RAF Stanbridge and I could either take a downgrade, resign or accept a posting in my present Grade. Due to financial reasons, I accepted a posting to the South Coast and ended up in Folkestone at Shorncliffe Army Garrison in the Area Office there.

We had our Church membership transferred to Folkestone Methodist where were warmly welcomed and have gained some lovely friends since 1978. The coastline at Folkestone is very appealing proving some lovely walks.

Sadly, my wife, Mavis, had a short illness and went to be with her Lord in 2017. I have a lovely daughter and son, now both in their fifties, who look after me so very well and for whom I am so grateful.
